# The College Council

### **Executive Committee**

The Executive Committee of the College of Psychologists of Ontario is elected from, and by, the members of the College Council. Its role is to monitor and coordinate the work of Committees and ensures that Council has all the pertinent information it requires for effective decision-making. The Executive Committee held five regular meetings during 2019-2020. The November 2019 meeting took place in Hamilton preceded by a 'meet and greet' reception for local members. Unfortunately, a second out-of-town reception and meeting in the spring was cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Following their election at the Council meeting of June 21, 2019, the Executive Committee met to appoint members of Council and professional members of the College to the six statutory committees as well as two non-statutory committees; Jurisprudence and Ethics Examination, and Finance and Audit.

### ACTIVITIES

The Executive Committee reviewed implementation of the Strategic Direction 2017-2022, monitored the progress of various College initiatives and brought policy issues to the attention of Council for consideration. The Executive, in conjunction with the Finance and Audit Committee, met with the College Auditors to review the draft Audited Financial Statements for 2018-2019 in preparation for presentation to Council. As well, following a review by the Finance and Audit Committee, the Executive considered the draft 2020-2021 budget recommending its approval to Council.

A variety of issues or topics were discussed by the Executive Committee including:

- Revised pass point for the Jurisprudence and Ethics Examination;
- Potential for College regulation of Applied Behaviour Analysts;
- Changes to the College's Guidelines for Completing the Declaration of Competence;
- Discussion of the performance review process for the Registrar & Executive Director;
- Recommendation to amend By-Law 18: Fees to reduce the annual membership fee for Interim Autonomous Practice members who wished to seek registration to permit them to work with one or two existing clients who may have relocated to Ontario.

The President and Registrar & Executive Director represented the College at meetings of the Association of Canadian Psychology Regulatory Organization and the President and Deputy Registrar attended the fall annual meeting of the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards.

## **Registration Committee**

The primary role of the Registration Committee is to:

- review all applications for registration of Psychologists and Psychological Associates referred by the Registrar & Executive Director, at all steps in the registration or appeals process, and to make individual registration decisions;
- 2. review applications under section 19 of the *Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 (RHPA)* for removal or modification of a term, condition or limitation;
- 3. review applications for change of area of practice or change of status for autonomous practice members; and
- 4. recommend registration policy and procedures consistent with the *RHPA*, with Ontario Regulation 74/15, Registration, with applicable federal/provincial agreements such as the amended *Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) 2017* and the *Ontario Labour Mobility Act, 2009*, or international agreements such as the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Board's (ASPPB) Reciprocity Agreement.

The Registration Committee is comprised of two panels which meet to consider and review individual cases. Each panel met six times. In addition, the full Committee met in plenary sessions on six occasions to consider a variety of broader policy issues.


### **Panel Deliberations**


All cases referred by the Registrar & Executive Director to the Registration Committee require thorough preliminary staff review with multiple interactions between applicants and staff. Many cases require multiple reviews by a panel of the Registration Committee during the period of supervised practice and for approval to participate in the oral examination. In some instances, where the decision is not favorable to the applicant, appeals are made to the Health Professions Appeal and Review Board (HPARB).

### **Results of Plenary Deliberations**

The Committee reviewed decisions and recommendations resulting from Health Professions Appeal and Review Board (HPARB) reviews. The Committee completed its work on revision of the Guidelines for Completing the Declaration of Competence and the Guidelines for Training for Supervised Practice Members including revisions to the supplementary training plan forms used by candidates and supervisors. The Committee began work on its plan to revise the College's Supervision Resource Manual so that it aligns with the College's Standards of Professional Conduct (2017) and reflects best practices in supervision.








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
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### Certificates Issued: Autonomous Practice




### International Academic Credentials other than the U.S.

# Inquiries, Complaints & Reports Committee (ICRC)

The Inquiries, Complaints and Reports Committee (ICRC) is responsible for investigating matters regarding members' conduct and competence. It is also responsible for inquiries into whether a member may be incapacitated. As required by law, every matter is considered by a panel of the ICRC. A panel is composed of one public and two professional members. Public members are appointed to the College by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

### INTRODUCTION

After a panel considers all of the relevant information in a matter, it decides how to proceed. This can range from taking no further action to referring the matter to the Discipline Committee. In some cases the panel may decide that remediation is appropriate. This can include advice or a program of continuing education. Every decision includes reasons, except if the decision is to refer the matter to the Fitness to Practice or Discipline Committees.


A party to a complaint may request a review of the ICRC decision by the Health Professions Appeal and

Review Board (HPARB). HPARB will consider whether the Committee's investigation was adequate and the decision was reasonable.

Investigations staff also engages with matters that do not become formal complaints or reports. For example, the College investigates non-members who may be holding themselves out as Psychologists or misusing the titles "Psychologist" or "Doctor."




### Health Professions Appeal and Review Board (HPARB)

There were 14 requests by complainants and/or members to HPARB to review ICRC decisions in the 2019-20 fiscal year. HPARB issued 12 Decisions, including those for reviews requested in previous years. All 12 of these decisions confirmed the ICRC decisions.

### Dispositions


The ICRC disposed of 100 cases in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. The ICRC took some action in 46 of these cases, ranging from providing Advice to referring matters to the Discipline Committee. While multiple dispositions may be reached in any given case, the most serious disposition for each case is represented here.



### Inquiries

Investigations and resolutions staff fielded 143 general inquiries by telephone and email in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. These inquiries included questions about professional conduct and how to submit a complaint or report, issues regarding access to information, and information regarding people who may be inappropriately holding themselves out as authorized to practice psychology in Ontario.



Of the 143 inquiries received, 27, or 19%, became some kind of investigation in the same fiscal year. An additional 27 current matters are related to inquiries made in previous fiscal years.

### **Discipline Committee**

The Discipline Committee conducts hearings into allegations of misconduct and incompetence, referred by the Inquiries, Complaints and Reports Committee. The Committee is also responsible for holding hearings of applications for the reinstatement of a certificate of registration which has been revoked as a result of a disciplinary proceeding.

### Hearings

Two hearings took place during the 2019-2020 fiscal year:

Dr. Judith Pilowsky: A hearing was held in this matter on July 4, 2019: <u>https://members.cpo.on.ca/public\_</u> register/show/2644

The Discipline Committee made findings of professional misconduct with respect to Dr. Pilowsky's provision of psychological services to an individual with whom Dr. Pilowsky had previously been in a romantic and sexual relationship, and with whom she remained close friends. The panel found that Dr. Pilowsky breached professional misconduct regulations 1.2, 1.10, and 1.34, as well as Standards 2.1 (General Conduct), 12.1 (Compromised Objectivity, Competence or Effectiveness Due to Relational Factors), and 12.2 (Compromised Objectivity, Competence or Effectiveness Due to Other Factors), of the Standards of Professional Conduct (Effective September 1, 2005, Revised March 27, 2009). The panel imposed an Order, which included a Reprimand, suspending Dr. Pilowsky's certificate of registration for one month. The panel also ordered that this suspension itself would be suspended if Dr. Pilowsky: (i) attended and competed the PROBE Course with an unconditional pass; (ii) attended the PROBE Plus Course and obtained a pass; and (iii) provided the results of the PROBE and PROBE Plus courses to the Registrar.

Dr. Ian Manion: A hearing was held in this matter on December 3, 2019: <u>https://members.cpo.on.ca/pub-lic\_register/show/1002</u>

The Discipline Committee panel made findings of professional misconduct with respect to Dr. Manion engaging in a personal and sexual relationship with an individual who had recently been a client. The panel found that Dr. Manion breached professional misconduct regulations 1.2 and 1.34, as well as 2.1 (General Conduct) and 12.5 (Relations with Current or Former Clients), of the Standards of Professional Conduct (Effective September 1, 2005, Revised March 27, 2009). The panel imposed an Order, which included a Reprimand, suspending Dr. Manion's certificate of registration for a period of 12 months. The panel also ordered that four months of this suspension would be suspended if Dr. Manion (i) attended and competed the PROBE Course and obtained an unconditional pass; (ii) attended the PROBE Plus Course and obtained a pass; and (iii) provided the results of the PROBE and PROBE Plus courses to the Registrar.

tay failed to adhere to a Specified Continuing Education or Remediation Program ordered by the Inquiries, Complaints and Reports Committee.

Dr. Peggi Liswood: <u>https://members.cpo.on.ca/pub-lic\_register/show/2644.</u> A hearing was held for this matter on August 24, 2020.

A referral was made to the Discipline Committee on May 25, 2020. At issue were allegations that Dr. Liswood engaged in a personal and sexual relationship with a former patient.

The Registrar referred an application for reinstatement to the Discipline Committee on March 27, 2019.

## **Quality Assurance Committee**

The Health Professions Procedural Code, which is Schedule 2 of the *Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991* (RHPA) requires that the College of Psychologists establish a Quality Assurance Program. A Quality Assurance Program is defined as "a program to assure the quality of the practice of the profession and to promote the continuing competence among the members". The Quality Assurance Committee has the statutory responsibility for the development and implementation of the College's Quality Assurance Program.

### **ACTVITIES**

Self-Assessment Guide and Continuing Professional Development Plan

Every member of the College is required to undertake a self-review and set new professional development goals every other year, through the completion of the Self-Assessment Guide (SAG) and Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Plan. This requirement also applies to members who hold Inactive status.

Members holding Certificates Authorizing Supervised Practice or Interim Autonomous Practice are required to complete the SAG Guide and CPD Plan each year.

### **New Self-Care Plan**

Members are now required to review factors that may adversely affect their ability to perform professionally, consider actions that will mitigate the risk of harm to their own well-being and that of their clients, and to create a <u>Self-Care Plan</u>.

### **Peer Assisted Reviews**

The Peer Assisted Review (PAR) is review of a member's practice conducted by two other members of the College. Members may be selected for a PAR due to a failure to comply with the requirement to complete the SAG or by random selection or stratified random selection. This year the stratified random selection pool was comprised of members whose practices included supervision of other practitioners.

Unfortunately, COVID-19 restrictions delayed the completion of a significant number of PARs this year.

### Funding for Therapy and Counselling

The Client Relations Committee administers the Funding for Therapy and Counselling program under the Code. Two individuals, approved for funding in previous years, continued to receive funding for therapy under the program. One recently approved applicant has not yet accessed funding under the program.

The Committee is also responsible for hearing applications for reinstatement by members whose certificate of registration was revoked following incapacity proceedings.
